Today's Old Testament lesson tells the story of Naaman, a great commander who has leprosy. Naaman hears that a prophet can heal him of his skin disease, and he eventually finds Elisha. Despite initial hesitation, Naaman humbles himself by following Elisha's instructions, and his skin is restored. The reading from Galatians continues last week's theme of walking in the Spirit. Themes of bearing one another's burdens and perseverance in doing what is right are explored in this writing from Paul. The Gospel lesson combines the themes of healing and walking in the Spirit from the previous readings. In this passage, Jesus sends out seventy-two disciples to heal the sick and to declare that the kingdom of God has come near.


