In this morning's readings from Deuteronomy, Moses teaches Israel the Lord's regulations concerning tithing, sharing of resources, and remission of debts. The Israelites' agrarian and financial practices are to be patterned after the Lord's mercy through the decree of set times for sharing of food and debt relief. These laws reflect the Lord's order of creation while their spirit embodies God's heart of compassion. Israel is called not to "be hard-hearted or tight-fisted toward your needy neighbor," by giving ungrudgingly even when years of debt relief are in sight. The same Spirit that inspired these laws would later come to anoint Jesus—the fulfillment of all the law and prophets, whose eternal reign is one of perfect justice.

SUMMER ORGAN WORK | This summer on weekdays from July 16 through August 17 specialists will work to “voice” the Chapel’s Benjamin N. Duke Memorial (Flentrop) Organ. Voicing is the art of giving a particular voice to each pipe. The voicer manipulates the mouth of each pipe (akin to the mouthpiece of a recorder, or the opening in a whistle) so it speaks promptly and has the right timbre and volume. The project will require complete quiet in the Chapel’s main sanctuary (nave). Visitors will be asked to enter and exit through the side transept doors so as not to disturb the work. The voicing work will not affect services and events on the weekends. Thank you for accommodating the inconveniences of this project.

GUEST PREACHER NEXT WEEK | Next week our guest preacher will be the Rev. Dr. Rodney S. Sadler Jr., associate professor of Bible at Union Presbyterian Seminary in Charlotte, North Carolina. Dr. Sadler’s teaching experience includes courses in biblical languages, Old and New Testament interpretation, wisdom literature in the Bible, the history and religion of ancient Israel, and African American biblical interpretation.
