Today's Old Testament and Gospel readings focus on prayers and petitions made to God. In the reading from Genesis, Abraham pleads with God to have mercy upon Sodom and Gomorrah. The passage from Luke includes the Lord's Prayer and Jesus's teaching on God's gift of the Holy Spirit. The letter to the church in Colossae exhorts its listeners to continue their walk in Christ, recognizing that they have been buried with Christ in baptism and raised with him through faith.

Today's Guest Preacher | Today's Wilder guest preacher is the Rev. Russell Pierce. He is the executive director of Housing for New Hope. Based in Durham, Housing for New Hope provides unsheltered people with long-term, supportive housing. Rev. Pierce previously served at Church World Service as national head of the CROP Hunger Walks, which partners with more than 1,000 communities across the country. An ordained elder in the United Methodist Church, he also served as an executive with the United Methodist Church's mission, relief, and development agency, leading a team that annually raised more than \$30 million for 600 community-based projects in more than 100 countries. More recently, he has led the creation of a new Certificate in Nonprofit Management at Duke Divinity School and serves as an adjunct instructor of nonprofit management for the program.

Guest Bell Ensemble | Bell Durham was founded in 2023 by Jerri Bland and Mitchell Eithun, and it is Durham's first community handbell ensemble. The goal of this ensemble is to provide high-caliber handbell music at local events and venues and to promote the art of handbells in Durham and beyond. They are joined by Imani Mckoy, mezzo-soprano soloist and alum of NC Central University, for the premiere of a new setting of "Come Sunday," arranged by Bell Durham director Mitchell Eithun. "Come Sunday" is a jazz standard derived from Duke Ellington's suite *Black, Brown and Beige* (1943) and is Hymn #728 in the United Methodist Hymnal. 
