The first lesson this week recounts God's sending of Ezekiel to God's chosen people, the Jews, in order to bring them the prophetic word of God. In the gospel lesson, Jesus sends his disciples out two by two, equipped with little more than their faith, to preach the good news. In between these stories of commissioning, the epistle extols the fortifying power of God's grace to strengthen us through whatever difficulties, even calamities, we may encounter as we follow the way of Christ in this world.
