In this morning's closing passage from Deuteronomy, we see Moses ascend Mount Nebo as the Lord surveys the Promised Land with him. God affirms that the covenant made with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob will be fulfilled in the giving of this land to their descendents. Moses sees what he has long sought before he dies at the Lord's command and is buried in the frontierland of Moab. While Moses could not enter the land himself because of his earlier prideful disobedience at the waters of Meribah-kadesh, he is still lauded as the one whom "the LORD knew face to face...unequalled for all the signs and wonders that the LORD sent him to perform." The mantle of leadership now passes to Joshua, who will lead Israel into the next chapter of God's story that unfolds to its completion in Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER | This week's Bishop W. Kenneth Goodson guest preacher is Dr. Anathea Portier-Young, who earned her PhD in Religion/ Hebrew Bible at Duke University, where she has also taught Old Testament and Hebrew Bible for more than 15 years. She holds a BA in Classics from Yale and MA in Biblical Languages from Graduate Theological Union. She is an expert in early Jewish literature and in gender, sexuality, and the body in the literature of the Old Testament. Her book, Apocalypse against Empire, Theologies of Resistance in Early Judaism, received the Manfred Lautenschlaeger award for theological promise. Her current book project, Prophecy in the Body, argues that biblical prophecy is portrayed as an embodied phenomenon that cannot be reduced to word or utterance. She is co-editor with Gregory Sterling of a book in press entitled Scripture and Justice: Catholic and Ecumenical Perspectives. She is a frequent contributor to Workingpreacher.org.


