David will offer a final, farewell recital as part of the Duke Chapel Organ Recital Series on January 26, 2014. At that time and on several other occasions during the coming months, there will be opportunities to express the Chapel's love, admiration, and deep appreciation for the countless ways he has touched and inspired the people of this community. David's own words speak of the close bonds between him and the people here: "Duke Chapel has been home to me over the past nearly 30 years in many ways. Your support not only of me but of all of Chapel Music is inspiring and encouraging. It has been a pleasure to serve at Duke."
