The lessons for today remind us that the God who is free to shape and form us as God wills is the one who calls us to the costly way of love. The prophet Jeremiah shares his vision of a potter working and reworking clay to make it something new. God speaks to Jeremiah saying, “Just as the clay is in the potter’s hands, so are you in my hand, O house of Israel.” In the letter to Philemon, Paul encourages Philemon to choose the more costly way, the way of love, in his dealings with his brother in Christ Onesimus. Jesus speaks a challenging word in the Gospel lesson about the importance of counting the cost when choosing to be his disciple. Jesus says that choosing to carry the cross is the way of discipleship and ultimately the way to life.

Bach Cantata Series Begins Sept. 18 | The first concert in this year's Bach Cantata Series is Sunday, September 18, at 5:00 p.m. There is no charge for admission. The program features music for the Magnificat, including one of J. S. Bach's greatest masterpieces, the celebratory setting of the *Latin Magnificat in D*, complete with trumpets and drums. The concert also presents the *German Magnificat*, in a rarely heard cantata written for the Feast of the Purification, and Bach's great *Fugue on the Magnificat* for organ. The program consists of Bach's *Overture in D major*, BWV 1068; *Meine Seele erhebt den Herrn* (German Magnificat), BWV 10; *Fuga sopra il Magnificat*, BWV 733; and *Magnificat in D major*, BWV 243.

Author and Lawyer Bryan Stevenson to Speak at Duke Chapel | The author and human rights lawyer Bryan Stevenson will hold a public conversation, titled “Seeking Justice and Redemption in the Public Square,” with Chapel Dean Luke A. Powery on Wednesday, September 21, at 6:00 p.m. Stevenson is the author of the book *Just Mercy*, which was adapted into a feature film. He is also the founder and executive director of the Equal Justice Initiative, through which he led the creation of two highly acclaimed cultural sites: the Legacy Museum and the National Memorial for Peace and Justice. The event is free and open to the public, but a no-cost ticket is required. Tickets are available through the Duke Box Office. The discussion will also be livestreamed via Zoom.
