

Today's scripture lessons focus on the God who comes to welcome and to save all people. In the lesson from Isaiah, the prophet speaks words of comfort for those who are fearful of heart. "God will come and save you," Isaiah declares, and the sign of this salvation will be healing and joy. Mark's gospel picks up on the theme of healing that Jesus brings. Mark tells the story of the Syrophoenician woman who pushes her way into Jesus's path to seek healing for her daughter, despite the cultural constraints of gender and race. This woman's fervent banter with Jesus becomes a window into the nature of God's kingdom and the healing and welcome that is for all.



TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER | Today's Boyles guest preacher is the Rev. Dr. Leonora (Nora) Tubbs Tisdale.
