This week our Old Testament and Gospel lessons contain well-known stories that tell not only of God's abundant generosity, but also of the human struggle with the same. In the lesson from Jonah, we read how Jonah feels spiteful anger when God relents and doesn't destroy Nineveh after its residents repent and turn from evil. God provides shade to Jonah to comfort him. If, without merit, God will provide care to Jonah, why wouldn't God care for those who sincerely repent and follow God? In the Gospel we hear of the landowner who pays the same wage to all his workers, whether they were hired earlier in the day or later. The workers who were hired early in the day complain that this is not, in essence, "fair." It is then that Jesus gives us an enduring lesson: the last will be first, and the first will be last.



A triple-graduate of Duke University, Dr. Bryant is president of the American Psychological Association and a professor of psychology in the Graduate School of Education and Psychology at Pepperdine University.
