Today's Scripture passages speak of the joy and sacrifice found in following Jesus. In Mark's Gospel Jesus challenges a rich man to go beyond outward religious observance and give up the wealth that has captured his heart. The Lord rewards those who sacrifice worldly wealth, status, and power for his sake, and promises that God can do the humanly impossible for those who have faith in Jesus. The passage from Job speaks of the times when we struggle to connect with God in the midst of trials and pain, while the letter to the Hebrews assures us of Jesus' high-priestly ministry, interceding on our behalf and showing compassion in our weakness. The Bible is also here described as the sword of the Spirit, a mighty gift from the Lord to guide, comfort, and teach us as we walk in relationship with the Triune God.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in Page Auditorium by the seats at the front left of the stage, in front of the organ. Immediately following Communion, a service of prayer for healing will be held in the same location. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

During the prelude the congregation is asked to remain prayerfully or meditatively silent. The Chapel welcomes families with children; if at any time during the service your child needs a place for active play, please utilize the nursery in the Box Office on the second floor of Page.
