This morning we celebrate World Communion Sunday, giving thanks for fellowship with Christians of every tribe and tongue around the world. At the Communion table, God's gift of our diversity becomes united in worship of Jesus Christ, the only Son of God. We sing hymns and songs from Argentina, England, Japan, and Germany, while the Chapel Choir offers anthems from Nigeria, South Africa, and the Dakota people of the First Nations. In our worship we remember the calling of the church throughout the world to be faithful in following Jesus. Lamentations reminds us that lament is a faithful way of finding hope in times marked by division and suffering. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus urges his disciples to follow him in the knowledge that faithful prayer in his name is powerful and effective.





**Sharing of the Bread and Wine** | All who love Christ, earnestly repent of their sins, and seek to be at peace with God and neighbor are invited to receive Communion. Wine is used for Communion. If you would prefer to receive grape juice, it is available upon request at a Communion station on the pulpit side.

If you have a gluten allergy, there is a server near the Memorial Chapel who will be ready to serve you gluten-free wafers and wine. If you will not receive Communion, you are welcome to come forward to receive a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.
