

If you desire gluten-free bread or grape juice, or to drink from a common cup, these are available from servers at the front near Memorial Chapel and near the back opposite the attendant's desk. If you will not receive Communion, you are welcome to come forward to receive a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

Today's Music | This morning we mark World Communion Sunday with music representing cultural expressions of Christianity across myriad times, places, and denominations. The Chapel Choir sings psalm settings by Ernani Aguiar, a contemporary Brazilian composer, and Florence Price, a twentieth-century American composer. The choral benediction is an east African folk hymn, sung in Swahili. Our hymns and liturgical music represent Methodist, Presbyterian, Catholic, Lutheran, and Baptist contributions to the church's common song, spanning four centuries (the eighteenth through the twenty-first) and six countries (England, Germany, America, Sweden, Taiwan, and Italy).

Blessing of the Animals Today | Dogs, cats—and maybe other animals—will join ministers and the Durham Children's Choir for the Blessing of the Animals worship service today at 3:00 p.m. on the Duke Chapel Quad. Pet owners are welcome to bring their animals to receive a blessing as part of the service. Those bringing pets are responsible for their animals and are asked to bring only pets that will be safe around children and other animals. The service will last about thirty minutes and includes music from the choir, scripture readings, and a sermon. Individual animal blessings will take place immediately after the service.

Organ Recital | Dr. Alcee Chriss III opens this season's Organ Recital Series with a concert today at 5:00 p.m. The performance on the Aeolian organ will feature music by J. S. Bach, Elgar, Litaize, Rachmaninoff, and others. Dr. Chriss is the assistant organist at Trinity Church Wall Street, New York City, as well as the university organist and artist-in-residence at Wesleyan University. Winner of the 2017 Canadian International Organ Competition, he was featured in the PBS documentary *Pipe Dreams*, and he appeared at the 2022 national convention of the American Guild of Organists. There is no charge for admission.

Theology Underground | The next Theology Underground meeting will discuss "This Here Flesh: The Sacred Memory of Toni Morrison" this Tuesday, October 8, at 6:30 p.m. in the Mary Lou Williams Center. The Chapel's Rev. Racquel Gill will lead the discussion with special guest Dr. Joseph Richard Winters, associate professor of religious studies. To honor the 100th anniversary of the birth of the literary giant James Baldwin, this year's Theology Underground series is engaging the intersections of theology and black literature.

'Ofrenda' Altar Piece | Honor the dead with a *Día de los Muertos Ofrenda*, a Day of the Dead altar piece, at the Chapel from October 10 through November 7. Visitors are invited to contribute to this sacred Mexican tradition by adding an offering in the form of photographs or objects that represent a departed loved one, or by adding a link to a paper chain that drapes over the Ofrenda. The display and related programs are being presented by the Chapel, Duke Arts, and Say the Thing. A group of artists and religious leaders will discuss the Ofrenda in a public conversation on Tuesday, October 15, at 6:30 p.m.

Film on Black Millennial Spirituality | Developed by the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture, the film *gOD-Talk* explores the faith and spirituality of seven black millennials (Atheist, Buddhist, Christians, Muslim, Ifa, and Spiritualist). The Chapel is among the sponsors of the Durhampremiere screening of *gOD-Talk* on Friday, October 18, at 6:00 p.m. at the Hayti Heritage Center. Register at chapel.duke.edu/godtalk.
