Today's lessons offer grave caution against complacency. In the reading from Zephaniah, there is a warning to avoid thinking that God will remain neutral; instead, the day of judgement will come, and on that day, silver and gold will have no saving power. In the Gospel, we are told a parable of three servants who are given responsibility for money while their employer is away. When he returns, the servants who invested well are praised. The servant who fearfully buried the money entrusted to him is chastised that he could have, at minimum, placed the money into a bank and earned interest, a corollary for the charge to use well that which we have been given.

Choral Evensong Next Sunday | Our next Choral Evensong service will be Sunday, November 26, at 4:00 p.m. With a theme of "Vespers for Versailles," the music will be from French composers, including Marc-Antoine Charpentier, Henri Dumont, Jean-Philippe Rameau, and Jean Titelouze. Choral Evensong at Duke Chapel follows the liturgy of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer with prayers and scripture readings. It also features choral and organ music from the English cathedral tradition, led by the Chapel's Evensong Singers.
