


SERVICE OF WORSHIP

On this Third Sunday of Advent, we hear Mary's joyful song of praise—the Magnificat—as she extols God's goodness in choosing her for the greatest of purposes despite her lowly status. Her response reminds us of the importance of song in the life of faith. In his letter, James encourages his readers to be faithful as they patiently await the coming of the Lord, even through suffering and trial. Just as the farmer awaits the rain to produce the precious crop, so too James calls those to whom he writes to wait for the Lord, the coming Judge of the world.





Our Advent Pattern of Worship | The prophecies of Isaiah heard across the four Sundays of Advent in this lectionary cycle (Year A) are proclaimed to a waiting people. Placement of these powerful readings at the start of the liturgy foregrounds their pronouncements of radical justice and peace. Just as we expectantly watch doors while waiting for deliveries, guests, or loved ones, we hear Isaiah's prophecies proclaimed at a physical threshold—that liminal space between the gathered assembly and the world that awaits the fulfillment of God's covenants.

University Prayer of Thanksgiving | Each week, we focus on a different campus unit, school, or department for whom to give thanks to God for their service and contributions to the wider university community and beyond. Today, we give thanks for the Department of Political Science.

Tour After the Service | Learn about the history, architecture, and life of Duke Chapel on a tour immediately following the service. The tour is free and lasts about forty-five minutes. Meet the docent outside in front of the Chapel.

Attendance Pad | This morning, worshipers are invited to indicate their presence using the attendance pad located on the pews at the center aisle. The purpose of this is to help the Chapel and Congregation better understand who worships with us on Sunday mornings. In addition, this registration will allow those who share a pew to greet each other by name.
