The season of Advent is a time of waiting for the promises of God. The God who has drawn near to Israel will soon draw nearer still in the form of a baby. The scripture lessons emphasize the promises that are to be fulfilled. Isaiah foretells the birth of a child to be called Emmanuel, meaning "God with us." The introduction to Paul's Letter to the Romans reveals how Jesus was the fulfillment of God's promise and opened the door of salvation to Gentiles as well as Jews. In Matthew's Gospel, Joseph is visited in the night with the strange message of Jesus's coming birth.

**Decoding "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel"** By the eighth century, daily evening prayer in the Christian tradition included a specific sequence of antiphons, or refrains, that were associated with the final days of the Advent season. In the seven days before Christmas Eve (December 17 to 23), each antiphon began with the letter "O" and a Latin title for Christ drawn from the Hebrew Bible. When the first letter of each title is arranged in reverse order (December 23 to 17), the phrase *ero cras* appears, roughly translated as "I will be there tomorrow." Around the twelfth century, these "O" antiphons were collected into a Latin hymn, "Veni Emmanuel," that we sing today (Hymn #211 in *The United Methodist Hymnal*).
