Today's scripture lessons focus on the anticipation and surprise of the Advent season. The reading from Micah reveals that the small town of Bethlehem will be the birthplace of a faithful and righteous ruler. The lesson from Hebrews tells of the coming of this ruler, Jesus, the one who comes to fulfill the will of God and sanctify all who believe by his own sacrifice. Luke tells the story of Mary and Elizabeth, each of whom comes to know the surprising ways of God. Elizabeth, long barren, conceives John the Baptist, as foretold by the angel Gabriel. Mary visits Elizabeth after her own encounter with Gabriel and the news of her own unexpected pregnancy, and the women rejoice and marvel at the mysterious work of God.


Magnificat

**GUEST PREACHER** | Today's Goodson Guest Peacher is the Rev. Alma Tinoco Ruiz, the director of the Hispanic House of Studies at Duke Divinity School. A lecturer in homiletics and evangelism, Professor Tinoco Ruiz is currently working on her Th.D. degree at Duke Divinity School and is the first recipient of the Lilly Endowment Inc. fellowship for Hispanic-Latino/a students in the Th.D. program in homiletics. She was awarded the Denman Fellow of the Foundation for Evangelism in 2016, the Forum for Theological Exploration Doctoral Fellowship in 2019, and the Hispanic Theological Initiative/Lilly fellowship in 2020. Professor Tinoco Ruiz is a practical theologian whose work centers on the intersection of homiletics, pastoral care, and evangelism. She is a provisional elder in the United Methodist Church.
