Founded in 2004 by Scott Hill and now under the leadership of Artistic Director Dena Byers, the Durham Children's Choir performs music from various cultures and genres and shares that music with the community at public and private events. The choir enjoys local collaborations with area music educators, composers, and arts organizations, including their participation in an annual Martin Luther King, Jr. event. They have performed internationally and nationally; most recently, they opened for Grammy Award-winning musician Lauren Daigle and performed in Carnegie Hall. These ventures enable the choir to have a greater presence in the community and provide the children with invaluable learning opportunities.
