World Relief Durham (WRD) helps refugees and other immigrants rebuild their lives in North Carolina through resettlement, employment, education, health, mental health, immigration legal, advocacy, volunteering, and youth mentorship programs. WRD provides case management, housing support, job-placement, financial literacy, and trauma-informed mental health services. WRD's Refugee & Immigrant Youth Services offer tutoring, mentoring, and family advocacy to help children succeed in public school. They also connect families with healthcare, Medicaid, and community resources, while empowering families to navigate systems independently. As a Christian organization, WRD partners with public, private, sacred, and secular entities to create a more just and welcoming Triangle.

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) continues work in western North Carolina to mitigate loss and damage from Hurricane Helene. All of the funds sent to UMCOR will be used to help those in need.
