Robert Parkins, the University Organist and a Professor of the Practice of Music at Duke, has played recitals throughout the United States and Europe as well as in Central America. His organ and harpsichord recordings have appeared on the

Calcante, Gothic, Musical Heritage Society, and Naxos labels. This season's recital will feature both the Brombaugh and Flentrop organs in a program of "Preludes, Fugues and Passacaglias."




